

CVI Needs Assessment 2024 Survey Questions

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Survey flow summary

- Ask Q1-Q8 of all respondents.
- If Q8 = No, ask only Q9-Q14 and then end the survey. This skip-out is designed so that organizations that do not have a case management-based CVI program will still be able to answer general questions in a short module (Q9-Q14) about broader gun violence prevention and youth support needs. Note that those organizations with a CVI case management program who responded “Yes” to Q8 (and are not answering Q9-Q14) have the opportunity to answer these same questions at the end of the survey where they are repeated as Q73-Q77).
 - If Q8 = Yes, just 1 program, skip Q9-Q14, ask Q15, skip Q16-Q17, and continue with Q18-Q82.
 - If Q8 = Yes, two or more programs, skip Q9-Q15, ask Q16-Q17, and continue with Q18-Q82.
